Notes to Unit Leadership and to Campsite Inspectors:

- The purpose of the campsite inspection is to help teach Scouts the value of having a clean, neat and safe campsite. The inspection is intended to be a positive experience for Scouts and leaders rather than a punitive measure.
- Inspectors are encouraged to give the “benefit of the doubt” when they inspect a site. Units need to have the opportunity to improve over the week if deficiencies are found early in the week.
- Early in the week, site inspection scores may be used as one of the methods for dismissing troops for meals. This is intended to reinforce the importance of a clean and safe site and is not meant to single out or disparage any troop or group.
- The total number of available points for the week are 125. Only 95 points are required for the Scouting Traditions Challenge. Each inspection item should be scored a zero, or a one or two, based on the item.
- Since all troops share the same site inspection score, emphasis should be placed on the common areas such as latrines, pavilions, campfire rings and general cleanliness. Items such as messy tents, open/closed flaps and similar judgment items should be kept in perspective such that one or two messy tents in one troop should not penalize the other two troops staying in the site. Use the comments section to make sure leaders are aware of the issues in their sites.
